FOREWORD

After COVID-19, most Australians were probably looking forward to a calmer, quieter and more peaceful 2023. Unfortunately however, this was not the case.

Bushfires, floods and other severe weather events have brought the changing climate into sharp focus. The impacts of nation-state conflict and regional instability have been felt domestically, not least through cost-of-living pressures and a more challenging economic and strategic backdrop.

The Australian Public Service (APS) also faced its own set of challenges.

At various points throughout the year, the service's core values were called into question, highlighting the gradual erosion of norms of behaviour, and capability, that affirmed the need for the government's ambitious APS reform agenda.

As Minister for the Public Service Senator Katy
Gallagher recognised in her annual statement on APS
reform, the public service is an enduring institution,
central to the strength and success of Australia's
democracy. While progress has been made against the
reform agenda, much remains to be done to strengthen
integrity, independence and capability across the APS,
and to rebuild trust in the service's commitment and
ability to deliver for all Australians.

The Sir Roland Wilson Foundation plays a unique and important role in this endeavour – leveraging the various strengths of our partnership to build an APS with the capability to use research and evidence to develop and effectively implement better public policy.

Through PhDs in law, economics, climate change, gender equality, and cybersecurity, or through masters programs in public policy, leadership, entrepreneurship and psychology, Sir Roland Wilson and Pat Turner scholars are addressing some of the nation's toughest challenges.

This year, the Foundation celebrated the first three Pat Turner scholarship PhD graduations – a remarkable achievement for scholars, the Australian National University (ANU) and the APS. In 2023, we welcomed nine Sir Roland Wilson and five Pat Turner scholars to ANU and Charles Darwin University (CDU).

The number of high-quality applications we continue to receive for both scholarship programs confirms for us the value of our offering. The 2023 independent mid-term review confirmed this, finding the Foundation is developing leaders with strong research and analytical skills, and building influential networks.

Over the past 12 months, eight scholars completed their programs and graduated – returning to the public service with renewed focus and energy. They join a growing and influential network of Foundation alumni who are now shaping evidence-based policy, programs and services. And just as importantly, alumni are maintaining linkages into academia, building the demand for, and access to, world-leading expertise to help the APS meet the challenges of our time.

I was pleased that the Australian Public Service Commission (APSC) renewed the Memorandum of Understanding with the Foundation for the Sir Roland Wilson scholarship program during 2023. This agreement reflects the strong relationships built over the last decade and provides support for the underpinnings of the scholarship programs for the next five years.

I thank the APS and our partners at ANU and CDU for their ongoing support and belief in our vision. The Foundation has benefited immensely from the generous support of outgoing ANU Vice-Chancellor Professor Brian Schmidt AC FAA FRS FTSE.

Professor Schmidt has been deeply committed to the cause of a strong public service. His consistent support truly reflects the University's mandate as Australia's national university. We are looking forward to building on our existing relationship with the incoming Vice Chancellor and President, Distinguished Professor Genevieve Bell AO FTSE FAHA, to further strengthen our contribution over the years ahead.

I would like to acknowledge the outstanding work of Sally-Anne Henfry, whose leadership as Executive Director has shaped the Foundation's success over the last four years. We wish Sally-Anne all the best on her return to the APS. SIR ROLAND WILSON

1904-1996

Sir Roland Wilson was an economist and acclaimed academic who had a remarkable career as a public servant. Born in 1904, Wilson was the first Rhodes Scholar from Tasmania. He completed two PhDs, one at University of Oxford and one at University of Chicago.


After a short academic career, Wilson joined the public service in 1932 and was quickly appointed Commonwealth Statistician. He then served as founding Secretary of the Department of Labour and National Service where he coordinated Australia's economic approach to World War II.

In 1951, he was appointed Secretary of the Treasury

– he remains Australia's longest serving Treasury

Secretary, with almost 16 years of service. He was
remembered in this role as an intellectual force, giving
expert advice that shaped economic policy.

After retiring from the public service, Wilson was Chairman on the boards of Commonwealth Bank and Qantas Airways. In recognition of his outstanding contribution to public service, Wilson was appointed a Commander of the British Empire (CBE) in 1941; a Knight Bachelor in 1955; and, a Knight Commander of the British Empire (KBE) in 1965.



WHO WE ARE







The Sir Roland Wilson Foundation is a partnership between The Australian National University (ANU), Charles Darwin University (CDU) and the Australian Public Service (APS).

Honouring the legacy of Sir Roland Wilson and Pat Turner, we build research and leadership capability in the APS and embed connections between policymaking and academia through postgraduate scholarships. The Sir Roland Wilson scholarship is a three-year, full-pay scholarship for PhD research at ANU for high performing EL1 and EL2 APS employees.

The Sir Roland Wilson Pat Turner Scholarship is a one-to-three-year, full-pay scholarship for any level of postgraduate study at ANU or CDU for high performing Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander APS 4 to SES Band 1 APS employees.

The Foundation was pleased to support 11 scholars to travel internationally in 2023 - enabling them to further their research and establish connections with academics and colleagues overseas.

TRANSFERABLE SKILLS INFLUENCE CHANGE

After completing a law degree, Rachel Wawra felt a yearning to study psychology. Now, after several years juggling work, family and study commitments, she has finished a Master of Professional Psychology through The Australian National University (ANU).

Rachel is a Torres Strait Islander and a Sir Roland Wilson Pat Turner scholar from the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade (DFAT).

She was among the first cohort to study the Master of Professional Psychology course at ANU and for the first two years, studied part-time. Her dedication has paid off.

"ANU has an amazing professional psychology program. The cohort is relatively small, so you get to know your peers really well. The lecturers provide lots of support and there are ample opportunities to develop practical skills," Rachel says.

Rachel was awarded the Pat Turner Scholarship to support her to complete her final year.

"Being awarded the Pat Turner Scholarship has helped me to finish. I am so grateful for the opportunity."

Rachel recognises how under-represented First Nations psychologists are in Australia.

"Less than one per cent of psychologists in Australia are Indigenous. That figure is even smaller in the Australian Public Service (APS)."

On completion of her studies, Rachel hopes to provide cultural support and assistance where needed at the individual level, as well as providing a unique perspective to shape DFAT and APS policy.

"Psychologists have so many skills that can be applied everywhere, including the ability to be able to influence change.

"For example, one of the biggest challenges we face when it comes to eliminating racism is human behaviour. Psychologists are well placed to make a difference in that space."

EVIDENCE DEMONSTRATES IMPACT OF DIVERSITY ON APS CAREERS

Powerful analysis by Nu Nu Win has provided evidence on the impact of diversity on careers in the Australian Public Service (APS).

The Sir Roland Wilson scholar from The Treasury used APS employment data to examine promotion prospects of women, staff with a disability, Indigenous staff and staff of non-English speaking backgrounds between 2001 and 2020.

The research came as the APS has developed its first culturally and linguistically diverse employment strategy and launched the SES 100 initiative, a plan to double the number of First Nations senior executives (SES) in the APS.

"My research takes into account a rich set of attributes: skills, experience, part-time status, job type, degree type and education level of employees, and estimates their likelihood of being promoted from APS level 4 through to SES," Nu Nu explains.

The analysis finds Indigenous employees are less likely than non-Indigenous to be promoted at most levels.

"Indigenous staff are more than 1.5 times less likely to be promoted from APS 4 through to APS 6 compared to non-Indigenous staff with similar skills, experience, education and other attributes. The likelihood of Indigenous staff being promoted improves as they progress upwards from APS 6, but they are still less likely to be promoted than their non-Indigenous colleagues."

Promotion prospects for staff from non-English speaking backgrounds worsen as they ascend ranks in the APS, a pattern that persists even if they were born and raised in Australia.

"They are around 1.2 times less likely to be promoted at junior ranks, but if they advance to EL2 they are more than 1.6 times less likely to be promoted to the SES compared to similar English-speaking background staff.

"This is in contrast to people of English-speaking backgrounds who immigrated to Australia later in life, who do not experience any promotion disadvantage."

Nu Nu's analysis also found that, over the 20 years of her study, women and staff with a disability have been less likely to be promoted at almost every level compared to similar men or staff without a disability.

The situation has not improved over time for any of the cohorts except women.

"Looking at how these estimates have changed over the past 20 years, we can see strong gains for women. Women are now as likely to be promoted at every level compared to similar men. In contrast, promotion prospects have not moved towards parity for Indigenous staff, staff with disability or staff of non-English speaking backgrounds."

Nu Nu highlights the need for robust data and evidence to help inform policies to overcome such inequalities.

"Where you don't have data and evidence, people tend to fill the gaps with biased explanations for the outcomes.

"A more diverse public service can better serve the needs of modern Australia. This kind of analysis can help us get there."

Nu Nu's research has made an outstanding contribution to progressing the diversity and inclusion debate in Australia and overseas. She was awarded the Sir Roland Wilson Foundation 2023 Joan Uhr Prize for her research and the efforts she made to share it widely.

VALE PENNY SULLIVAN

In 2023, the Sir Roland Wilson Foundation was saddened by the passing of Sir Roland Wilson scholar Penny Sullivan.

Penny was a 2018 scholar from Murray-Darling Basin Authority. Her PhD research explored how state and federal governments pursue their objectives in water conflicts.

Through her research, Penny sought to develop a framework for analysing water governance issues. She was interested in the bargaining strategies and the resources central state authories employ to negotiate with sub-national authorities around water policy and governance decisions.

Penny based her research on three case studies – Jucar-Vinalopo Water Transfer project in Spain, the Colorado Basin in the United States and the Murray-Darling Basin in Australia

Dr Daniel Connell and Associate Professor Keith Barney from ANU Crawford School of Public Policy were Penny's academic supervisors.

"Penny's research was attuned to the complexity of inter-governmental relations, as the 'hidden dimension of government'," Associate Professor Barney said.

"Her analysis and interviews were aimed at a comparative understanding of these complexities and the implications for actual water management decisions in Australia, Spain and the US.

"Her insider perspective with the Murray Darling Basin Authority helped Penny to be alert to these complexities, in a way that few water researchers are able to crack. "Penny was engaged in exciting and innovative research and she was on her way to making her mark in the field."

In recognition of her work, Penny will be awarded her PhD posthumously.

We were also pleased to see Pat Turner coursework scholar Rachel Wawra graduate with a Master of Professional Psychology from ANU. Congratulations to Rachel for your success borne from hard work and commitment over several years.

In 2023, the Foundation introduced a second annual intake for Pat Turner coursework scholars. The first group of scholars to commence in Semester 2 have settled in to their studies well, and we will build on this momentum and continue to offer two intakes for coursework scholars again in 2024.

The 2023 Pat Turner Scholar Forum, themed 'Strengthening Connections' brought scholars and alumni together on campus at ANU. In a keynote address, Lowitja Institute Chair Selwyn Button spoke to scholars about his career in the public service, and his experience advocating for better outcomes for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples. Scholars and alumni also discussed influencing public policy change using learnings from postgraduate programs, as well as the importance of First Nations perspectives in academia.

The Pat Turner scholar Masterclass, held the following day, gave scholars the opportunity to learn more about the APS Indigenous Senior Executive Service network.

I know scholars also gained a great deal from their session on building skills for wellbeing and cultural strength with Joe Williams.

We were again able to support two scholars and an alumna to participate in a week-long program on First Nations governance at Charles Darwin University (CDU) this year. Led by Yolgnu researchers at CDU's Northern Institute and members of the CDU 'Ground Up' research team, participants explored approaches to research and policy design for First Nations public servants.

I congratulate the 2023 Pat Turner prize winners: Dr Lisa Conway (research) and Genna Lehman (Coursework). The Foundation's 2023 Ian Castles alumni prize was awarded to Pat Turner alumna Carlyn Waters, recognising her work to enable Pat Turner scholars and build strong relationships between academia and the public service.

We continue to be committed to working with partners at ANU, CDU and the APS to further the pipeline of Pat Turner scholarship applicants and are grateful for the support we have received in this endeavour to date.

Thanks also to my colleagues on the Pat Turner Scholarship Advisory Group for their outstanding contributions throughout the year.



Commencement Dinner

The Foundation officially welcomed the 2023 Sir Roland Wilson and Pat Turner scholars at the Commencement Dinner in March.

The dinner was held at the Gallery (Kambri Cultural Precinct, ANU), and was hosted by Foundation Chair Dr Martin Parkinson AC PSM. The Australian National University Vice-Chancellor Professor Brian Schmidt AC FAA FRS FTSE welcomed scholars to the University and encouraged them to take advantage of the networks ANU and the Foundation provide during their time on scholarship.

Scholar Symposium

Themed 'Reinvigorating, Reimagining and Reforming the Australian Public Service', the 2023 Scholar Symposium was held on 7-8 June on campus at ANU.
